The Coalition Against Israeli Apartheid hosts The Struggle Continues! Boycotting Israeli Apartheid Conference

Oct 6-8, 2006 - Toronto

WHAT: The three-day conference will develop local, national and international understandings, strategies and networks related to opposing Israeli apartheid and building solidarity with the Palestinian struggle for self-determination. It will also provide space for different sectors (including campus groups, unions, community and faith-based organizations) to consolidate a plan for a boycott, divestment and sanctions (BDS) campaign in Canada and Quebec.

WHY: In July 2005, 171 Palestinian civil-society organizations launched a call for a comprehensive Boycott, Divestment and Sanctions (BDS) strategy as the centerpiece of international solidarity efforts with the Palestinian people. They called for the BDS campaign to be maintained until Israel meets its obligation to recognize the Palestinian people's inalienable right to self-determination and fully complies with the precepts of international law.

The Canadian government provides extensive political and economic support to the Israeli apartheid regime. Canadian corporations profit through investments and joint operations with Israeli companies and Canada has a Free Trade Agreement with Israel. Prime Minister Harper offered unqualified support for the Israeli government's aggression during the war in Lebanon and the assaults on Gaza this summer.

In response, the BDS campaign in Canada has begun to take shape in powerful ways. For example, in May the Canadian Union of Public Employees (CUPE-Ontario) passed a resolution in support of a BDS campaign explicitly targeting Israeli apartheid.

This conference will provide a space for various sectors in Canada to strategize and coordinate their efforts, and to build on recent local, national and international successes of the BDS campaign.

WHO: The conference will bring together activists from Toronto and across Canada and Quebec with BDS campaigners from Palestine and the UK, and anti-Apartheid organizers from South Africa.

Keynote speakers include Jamal Juma' of Stop the Wall Campaign, Palestine; Salim Vally, a campaigner with the Palestine Solidarity Committee in South Africa; and Rafeef Ziadeh, from the Coalition Against Israeli Apartheid. The conference will close with a plenary with Co-Chief Robert Lovelace of Ardoch Algonquin First Nations, and Adam Hanieh, of the Coalition Against Israeli Apartheid.
